Meanwhile, the colonial cities that we will visit on this tour, boast picturesque cobblestone streets, colorful facades, and vibrant street life, perfect for street photography.

Whether you're capturing the kaleidoscope of colors in its markets, the serene landscapes, or the heartfelt traditions of its people, Mexico offers an endless array of subjects to fill a photographer's portfolio with unforgettable images.





ITINERARY

DAY 1 | 30 November: Mexico City

Welcome to Mexico City! Meet your driver at the airport and transfer to your hotel.

Accommodation: Zocalo Central.

DAY 2 | 1 December: México – Teotihuacan – México

After breakfast, meeting in the hotel lobby. Departure for a city tour, mainly of the Zocalo, one of the largest squares in the world. There stands the largest Cathedral in the Americas, built on the site of the former grand Aztec temple "Teocalli". Its three naves shelter many chapels and altars adorned with gold, including the beautiful "Altar of Forgiveness". The Palacio Nacional (National Palace) was built on top of the Palace of Moctezuma and features frescos painted by famous Mexican muralist Diego Rivera. Nowadays, it houses the President's offices.

The Templo Mayor (only outside) is a relic of the ancient Aztec capital Tenochtitlan... a pre-Columbian temple in the middle of urban jungle: simply amazing!

Then we head to the archeological site of Teotihuacan with the pyramids of the Moon and the Sun, the Temple of the Feathered Serpent (Quetzalcóatl), the Temple of the Feathered Snails and the Palace of the Jaguars. The "City of the Gods" was built in the seventh century and was probably, with its 200,000 inhabitants, the most populated city in the world at that time.

We discover Chapultepec and its treasures. This park is full of history that your guide will tell you about while you stroll around it. From the sacred Aztec site to the viceroys and presidents' residence, you will discover the history of this park and its castle.

We head back to the hotel in the late afternoon. Accommodation: Zocalo Central.

DAY 3 2 December: México - El Paso de Cortes - Puebla

Meeting in the hotel lobby for a departure towards El Paso de Cortes located between the Popocatepetl (5452m/17,887ft) and Iztacihuatl (5286m/17,342ft) volcanoes.

From there, we go on a hike (1 to 2 hours) and admire the splendid views over both legendary volcanoes. Note: nature reserve admission tickets to be paid for on site (about 1.70 USD)

Then we head to Puebla. This jewel was the first city to be built in Mexico after the arrival of the Spanish in 1531. It was the headquarters of general Ignacio Zaragoza's army who defeated the French forces on May 5th 1862.


Since that date, Puebla has been officially known as "Heroica Puebla de Zaragoza". Walk in the city center where we discover the Capilla

del Rosario, Santo-Domingo church, the Zocalo and the Barrio de los Sapos.

Accommodation: Hotel La Purificadora.

DAY 4 | 3 December: Puebla – Zapotitlan de Salinas – Oaxaca

After breakfast, depart for Oaxaca, declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO, and considered one of Mexico's most beautiful towns for its colorful façades.

On the way to Oaxaca, stop in the Zapotitlán Salinas, a desert territory, for a walk in the middle of a sea of cacti of all shapes and sizes. Marvel at the unique beauty of this landscape where there are some salt marshes that the ancient inhabitants used to exploit. In one of the cellars, the Buried Chapel was built.

Continue towards Oaxaca and arrive in the afternoon.

Accommodation: Hotel Grana BnB.

DAY 5 | 4 December: Oaxaca – Monte Alban – Oaxaca

In the morning, visit the prestigious Zapotec site of Monte Alban. Once the ruling city of Oaxaca's central valley, it sits 2000 meters above sea level. Here, you will find remains of palaces, temples, an observatory and a ball court, all with incredible views over valleys and mountains.

Free lunch at the market: We recommend that you order a tlayuda. You will be satisfied!

In the afternoon, we head back to Oaxaca. Visit of the town center, including the Zocalo, the Santo Domingo Cathedral and its museum, Benito Juarez's house.

Nestled in a valley in the middle of the Sierra Madre del Sur, the city of Oaxaca is characterized by its incredible artistic activity, rich and varied handicrafts and its cultural activities. It is also home to major exhibitions and festivals, representative of the cultural richness and diversity, deeply rooted in the traditions and customs.

Accommodation: Hotel Grana BnB.

DAY 6 | 5 December: Oaxaca – Cancún – Valladolid

Departure for Oaxaca Airport 4 hours before take off.

Domestic flight Oaxaca – Cancún included

Arrival and welcoming at the airport. Transfer to Valladolid. Check-in at the hotel in Valladolid, a small and authentic Mexican town, where it is pleasant to stroll around on the Zocalo, near the San Bernardino Convent. In the evening, you will appreciate the pretty pastel colored houses, while eating an ice cream.

Accommodation: Hotel Posada San Juan.

DAY 7 6 December: Valladolid – Rio Lagartos – Valladolid

This morning travel to Rio Lagartos, a biosphere reserve on the north coast of the peninsula. Here you can find the densest concentration of pink flamingos colony in Mexico. Take a boat trip to the lagoon, and a discovery ride into the mangrove. Look out for the wildlife here; pelicans, ibis, cormorants, ospreys, egrets, crocodiles.

Return to Valladolid in the afternoon.

Accommodation: Hotel Posada San Juan.

DAY 8 7 December: Valladolid – Chichen Itza – Cenote Yokdzonot – Izamal – Mérida

After breakfast, head to Chichen Itza, one the seven wonders of the modern world. Built by the Maya, and then reorganized by the Toltecs, "Mexico's rich cultural Chichen Itza symbolizes the unification of both religious cultures. *heritage further elevates* The site, which at its height was the most important religious center of the peninsula, is the largest archaeological site in Yucatan.

> Cool down this afternoon in the beautiful cenote Yokdzonot which sits off the beaten track of the tourist trails. This is a crystal clear water basin in which it is pleasant to swim in a natural environment. We suggest you stop for lunch in a restaurant just next to the cenote.

> In the afternoon, journey to the gorgeous colonial town of Izamal, entirely painted in bright yellow. The Franciscan convent San Antonio de Padua was built on top of a Mayan ceremonial center, and is the continent's largest cloister.

> In the late afternoon, arrive in Merida, the capital city of Yucatan. Merida has maintained its captivating colonial charm and strong personality while enjoying great economical growth in recent years. You will find many historical monuments, churches and restaurants with both local and international food. The city is dotted with pleasant little squares which are perfect to relax in, have a drink and listen to a marimba-playing band.

Spend the evening exploring the handicrafts market which offers numerous souvenirs like the renowned huipils (very colorful embroidered woman tunics), the authentic "Panama" hats, the true Yucatecan all-cotton hammocks and many more.

Accommodation: Hotel Casa Lucia.

DAY 9 8 December: Mérida – Tekit – Mérida

Tekit is known in the peninsula as the village where the best guality guayaberas (elegant traditional shirts) are produced. The growth of this activity brings to this village all its dynamism, the central square is teeming with life at all hours and conviviality is essential.

Today, we invite you to discover the life of the village by meeting its inhabitants who will teach you about their daily lives and their craftsmenship.





Put your hands together with Marco the baker who will teach you the recipes that make his business so successful. Then visit Leidi, who makes magnificent huipiles embroidered with a thousand flowers. In recent years she has been rehabilitating several forgotten embroidery techniques by studying old fabrics and meeting the latest craftswomen who still possess this knowledge. After, visit Ana's who will take you to her aromatic garden and show you her many melipona beehives.

In the afternoon, visit a guayaberas workshop. Here, you will work as a family and by hand: one cuts the canvas, another embroiders it, another assembles it... Each one has his own speciality.

You can also visit the Luís' plot; he is the first inhabitant of the village to rehabilitate mixed farming, and his audacity is now rewarded! His land overflows with vegetables and the branches of the trees bend beneath the weight of abundant and delicious fruit. Certainly the best fruit of your stay!

Note: Activities may vary depending on the day of visit.

Accommodation: Hotel Casa Lucia.

DAY 10 | 9 December: Mérida – Tour Cenote – Uxmal – Campeche

Cenotes are natural pools of fresh and crystalline water, where the sun's rays create spectacular lighting effects. On the way to the first cenote, stop at a typical Mayan market where the colors of fruits and vegetables are matched only by those of the women's traditional clothing. Then, take some time to explore 2 cenotes, and take a refreshing swim in the forest. One thing is certain, you will leave completely transformed.

The archaeological site is peaceful and not widely visited by tourists. You will love it! Uxmal, in Mayan language, means "Thrice Built", but in reality the city was constructed five times. One of the best preserved sites on the peninsula, this massive complex includes The Great Pyramid, House of the Turtles, a vast ballgame court and the Governor's Palace. The water is really scarce in the region which explains the omnipresence of representations of the rain god Chac-Mool.

Arrive in Campeche at the end of the day.

Accommodation: Hotel Castelmar.

DAY 11 | 10 December: Campeche – Calakmul

After breakfast, visit the archaeological site of Edzna. There, we see the 31m-high Edificio de los Cinco Pisos (Five Story building) as well as the Templo de Mascarones (Temple of Masks), featuring carved portrayals of the sun deity. The word Edzná comes from "House of the Itzás", which has led Archaeologists to believe that this Mayan city was influenced by the family Itzá long before they founded Chichen Itzá.

DAY 12 | 11 December: Calakmul – Bacalar

Visit the archaeological site of Calakmul, located in the state of Campeche, at the heart of a biosphere reserve, home to numerous jaguars. This still quite unknown site is one of the jewels of the Mayan culture and was, at its peak, the direct rival of Tikal (Guatemala). Like in Tikal a few years ago, it's possible to observe wildlife wandering freely on the site (toucans, monkeys, oco pheasant). Jaguars usually prefer to wander at night, but who knows, maybe you'll get lucky.

The Laguna Bacalar is a 50km (31 miles) long and 2km (1.25 miles) wide lagoon, surrounded by a beautiful mangrove forest. It earned the nickname 'the lake of seven colours' for its incredible water color variations. Optional excursions of waterskiing or wakeboarding (non-included) are available. For the slightly less daring, there is the possibility to go on a boat tour of the lagoon(non-included).

Spend the evening at leisure around the lagoon. Accommodation: Hotel Bacalari.

DAY 13 | 12 December: Bacalar

Boat tour on the Bacalar lagoon (collective service without guide – 3h tour): 50 kilometers long and 2 kilometers narrow, the lagoon is located in a beautiful mangrove forest. Its incredible variations of blue shades have given it the nickname of the lagoon of seven colors.

You leave on a small boat to discover the lagoon. You will discover 3 cenotes, the island of the birds, as well as the channel which was used by the pirates during their repeated assaults to plunder Bacalar. You will be able to swim throughout the day.

End of the day free at the edge of the lagoon.

NB: Don't forget your bathing suit, sun cream, a hat or cap and a towel. Accommodation: Hotel Bacalari.

DAY 14 | 13 December: Bacalar – Tulum

After breakfast, head north and visit the archeological site of Tulum. This World Heritage Site sits on a cliff edge facing the Caribbean sea and witnessed the arrival of the first colonists. In 1518, the Spanish conquistador Juan de Grijalva set foot on the beach, under the stunned eye of Batab (Mayan governor of the time). Visit this ancient harbor (and the only one known) built in 1200 and which disappeared at the end of the sixteenth century.



DAY 15 | 14 December: Tulum

Spend the day in the Magic Town of Tulum, either shopping in the small boutiques, strolling up the central street, relaxing on the white sand, swimming in the crystal clear blue, Caribbean waters or sampling some local seafood. DAY 16 | 15 December: Tulum – Cancún

Hasta Luego Mexico! Depart from the hotel in private transportation to Cancun Airport and arrive at the terminal at least 3 hours before your flight is due to take-off.

Note: If you would like to extend your trip a bit longer, once our photography tour ends you can stay a few extra days relaxing in Tullum or the beaches of Cancun. Just let me know, our travel agent can organise this for you.


Critique session

 2 x DSLR or 2 x Mirrorless full frame cameras recommended (check your baggage allowance with your airline/travel agent)

Tour dates: 30 November - 15 December 2025

The tour commences in Mexico City and ends in Cancun

Cost is US\$14,840 per person, twin share;

Optional single room supplement US\$1,990

Maximum 8 participants

A deposit of **US\$2,000** is required when you book the workshop

Terms of payment

- A deposit of US\$2,000 must be paid to secure your place. The deposit is non-refundable unless you can sell your place to someone else. You will get refunded if the tour did not go ahead
- The Registration Form must be filled in and signed by each participant at the time of paying the first deposit.
 Participation will be declined otherwise
- The remaining balance must be paid on or before
 31 August 2024
- Bookings will be accepted strictly in the order they are received
